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# Student Spotlight: Timothy Gandy Cooks Up a Better Life

Timothy Gandy had been out of work for 10 years before he came to JobTrain. He describes this period as "hitting bottom." The accumulation of previous experiences and this period of unemployment created a negative mindset. In his words, "I had a history of sabotaging success that kept putting me back where I started from." Through hard work and perseverance, however, he was able to overcome these obstacles and succeed at JobTrain.



Tim enrolled in JobTrain's culinary arts program where he studied at Mime's Café under Chef Adam Weiner. There, he says, he was initially held back by the continuing problem of a mental block to his own success. He was highly motivated to succeed, but once he started doing well in culinary training, he found that he tended to respond poorly to praise for his accomplishments.

However, he was able to overcome this barrier by working with Chef Adam, who notes, "When they've been beaten up their whole lives, sometimes they can't handle their own success." Tim credits Chef Weiner with a large role in his success, saying, "I'm really proud; I'm really grateful for what Chef has done for me." After graduating from JobTrain, Tim still had to prove to himself that he could succeed in the real world, and he did so when he landed a job as a chef at Menlo Park College. Fortunately, JobTrain's reputation had preceded him, as he was hired to replace another JobTrain graduate who was moving on.

Timothy Gandy is a great example of how JobTrain can help people turn their lives around. Although he had built up a negative mindset that impeded his success, Tim was able to overcome this mental roadblock while learning the skills to succeed at JobTrain. His continuing employment at Menlo College is a testament to the effective learning environment that JobTrain provides and the way it can help people change their lives.

I would be doing his memory a great disservice by not being the best I can be. Sometimes I want to run and hide in a corner and cry because my dad is gone. But I won't do it because he raised me to run from nothing and no one. I am part of the Solar Training Program at JobTrain to prove to myself and my father that I am a man of responsibility, dependability, and integrity. I cannot fail!"

JobTrain is bulging at the seams with people like Leon who refuse to fail. Competition is tough in this job market - but JobTrain students are preparing for high demand jobs, and they are successfully launching new careers. Many who were in the mainstream before the economic downturn are now homeless; but they stay focused on their goals. They will not give up. Others who would be considered risky hires in any job market face tough competition for jobs. They are succeeding, too, and refuse to give up. They are our champions.

JobTrain is a 501c3 nonprofit service provider, established in 1965. Programs and services are provided to our low-income students at no cost, thanks to generous support from individual, corporate, and foundation donors, as well as government grants.

## ***JobTrain Prepares to Provide Financial Aid***

JobTrain is currently in the process of expanding its training programs to qualify for Title IV WASC accreditation that will make JobTrain students eligible for financial aid, including Pell grants. This effort is part of a long range plan that was launched more than a year ago. JobTrain students will be eligible to receive funding two years after the Department of Education has officially certified JobTrain's courses as Pell grant compliant.

To achieve compliance, JobTrain has modified various aspects of its programs, most importantly lengthening classes to 20 weeks (previously classes were 12-16 weeks long), as well as broadening the range of skills that JobTrain teaches. Notably, the Telecom Service Technician program now includes wireless training, and the Professional Health Worker program, previously known as Certified Nursing Assistant, now includes acute care and home health care. Also, the Life Skills and Employment Success programs, once offered as adjunct courses of instruction, are now integrated into the individual vocational training programs. JobTrain also offers vocational-specific math classes, such as Solar Math, Culinary Math and Construction Math.

# PROGRAM UPDATES



## *JobTrain's Culinary Instructor Wins National Recognition*

The Food Educators Learning Community held their first nationwide summit in Charleston, South Carolina in the last week of February. The summit culminated in a Saturday afternoon "throw down" where culinary instructors from across the country competed for the title of Ultimate Teacher. JobTrain's Chef Adam Weiner was one of eight chefs nominated nationwide and the only chef from the West Coast. He took home the bronze medal.

Reacting to the award, Chef Adam commented, "I am still a bit shocked to be judged by my peers as the third best in the country."

Each of the eight chefs had 15 minutes to teach a culinary arts lesson. Chef Adam gave a reduced version of his lecture on cooking with passion and working with pride as well as a knife demonstration with tropical fruit. This is the first lecture that he gives to each class in the Culinary Arts program at JobTrain, and he has given it to over 400 students. JobTrain's culinary program includes training in commercial food preparation, nutrition, safety, sanitation and externships. Upon completing the program, students receive National ServeSafe certification. Chef Adam has run the program since July of 2003. The course is designed to take people with no commercial kitchen background and place them in positions as prep cooks and line cooks. Former students of Chef Adam have found work at restaurants as prestigious as the Cliff House in San Francisco. Many go up the ranks all the way to Sous Chef and Executive Chef.

In addition to his activities at JobTrain and writing several columns for magazines and periodicals, Chef Adam Weiner, known to his students as Chef Adam, or simply "Chef", is a culinary instructor for the United States Navy. His activities there led to his nomination by Chef Michael Harants, Executive Chef for the Navy, to participate in the throw down.

## *PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT: Professional Health Worker Training*

The Professional Health Worker program trains clients in the skills needed to be hired in the medical profession, including Certified Nurse Assistant, Reproductive Health Specialist, Physical Therapist, Surgical technician, X-Ray technician, acute care, Home Health Aid, and a variety of other related jobs. Most graduates go on to work in a hospital, nursing home, or residential care facility. Clients face an array of challenges coming into the program. Many do not have a high school diploma and, for others, English is a second language. On average, 24 students graduate from the program after each 12-week cycle.

Clients begin with a five-week period of theory training at JobTrain's Menlo Park campus before moving to Our Lady of Fatima Villa assisted living facility in Saratoga for clinical on-site training. Clients leave the program with a Certified Nursing Assistant Certification issued by the State of California.

"You have to be a certain kind of person to do this," says Professional Health Worker counselor Ralph Korach. Clients must be "caring, loving, and compassionate, with a passion for their work and a willingness to help someone else all of the time." According to Mr. Korach, "Many of the individuals being cared for suffer from Alzheimer's and dementia, so patience and reliability are paramount to succeeding in the program. However, the most important quality, is a willingness to work hard. Clients report that the program is highly challenging -- but equally rewarding.

Program administrators from JobTrain consult with a Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) every five months. This ensures the needs of our clients are being met, while facilitating prospective employment opportunities.

An equally important aspect of the Professional Health Worker program is the class culture and sense of community. Clients look forward to events that bring them together with students from other programs. A favorite among the students is the sharing of meals via potluck. Professional Health Workers administer blood pressure checks on designated days -- which unites JobTrain students from various programs. Perhaps an unexciting event for others -- it's a welcome opportunity for JobTrain students who enjoy the camaraderie.
